






Background

Ten steps to improve Cardiac Arrest Survival

Ten Steps to Improve Cardiac Arrest Survival

- Establish a cardiac arrest registry
- 2. Begin Telephone-CPR with ongoing training and QI
- 3. Begin high-performance EMS CPR with ongoing training and QI
- 4. Begin rapid dispatch
- Measure professional resuscitation using the defibrillator recording (and voice if possible)
- Begin an AED program for first responders, including police officers, guards, and other security personnel.
- Use smart technologies to extend CPR and public access defibrillation programs to notify volunteer bystanders who can respond to nearby arrest to provide early CPR and defibrillation
- 8. Make CPR and AED training mandatory in schools and the community
- 9. Work toward accountability submit annual reports to the community
- Work toward a culture of excellence



- Renowned international organizations, emergency medical services, and resuscitation leaders achieved consensus on the establishment of a Global Resuscitation Alliance May 28-29th 2016 in Copenhagen at an international Utstein Meeting.
- This global network focuses on collaborating to implement best practices to increase survival from sudden cardiac arrest.
- The participants committed themselves to the ambitious target of increasing survival rates by 50 percent. This agreement, signed in Copenhagen, Denmark and constituting the culmination of years of international effort, is a major and decisive step in global efforts to save more lives from sudden cardiac arrest.
